"Job Applicant" Definition

The US Department of Labor has clarified record keeping provisions concerning who is an "applicant" in the context of the Internet and related technologies. The October issued rule applies to federal contractors who are subject to the record keeping provisions of the laws enforced by the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs.

When a contractor accepts expressions of interest for a particular position via the Internet or related technologies and paper applications, the new rule applies. If the contractor does not accept electronic submissions, the existing record keeping standards apply.

The program, sponsored by the US Department of Commerce, pays for half the cost of consultants or industry-specific experts for projects that improve a manufacturer's competitiveness.

Energy Assistance Program

The area's local Community Action Agencies are accepting applications from low income, elderly, and disabled Georgians for **heating assistance this winter**. The LIHEAP program operates on a first come, first served basis. Those in need of assistance should apply as soon as possible.

To qualify, applicants must have a yearly household income less than or equal to 150% of the federal poverty guidelines. For one person the amount is \$14,355; add \$4,890 per additional person.
